Course information

Core concepts in palliative medicine – the dying patient

This 3-day course provides state of the art knowledge for physicians around core concepts in end-of-life care.

Purpose and goal

Many physicians experience insufficient knowledge in symptom management and care of the seriously ill and dying patient. The goal of this course is to provide core competencies in symptom management and communication skills, thus helping the physician to improve the quality of delivered end of life care.

After participating in the course, the participant should have gained knowledge about identifying the dying patient, performing informative discussions with patients and relatives about transition to end of life care, and initiating basic symptom management in end of life.

Course outline

The course is based on a mixture of lectures, small and large group discussions, some of them case-based.

Course content

- Basic concepts in palliative medicine.
- Symptom management pain, gastrointestinal symptoms, dyspnea, anxiety, delirium. Focus on pharmacological treatment.
- The dying phase.
- Emergencies in palliative medicine.
- Communication in end of life with patients, relatives and within the team. Breaking bad news.

Both malignant and non-malignant diseases will be discussed.

Physicians in clinical specialties who take care of patients in end of life.
